## Seminarian Collection 2012 Audio Script

**Bishop Ricken:** Hello, my brothers and sisters. This is Bishop David Ricken. During the month of August, we hear Jesus preaching about the *Bread of Life* at all of our weekend liturgies. At the high point of his message, Jesus says to the crowds, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day."

This scripture passage from the Gospel of John is a magnificent invitation for each of us to live forever. God has not abandoned his children. Quite the opposite; God has given us what we need to live here in this world, and to live forever. As Catholics we share this Good News in many ways, whether through a kind gesture to someone in need, a word of hope to someone in pain, or a gentle sharing of our faith with friends. Let us not forget that the source and summit of everything we do is the Eucharist, which was entrusted to the Apostles, and remains with us today.

I am pleased to introduce to you two men who have been called to the priestly vocation. They have promised to give their whole lives in order to share the *Bread of Life* with all those who seek Jesus Christ in the world today. On June 2, 2012, Ryan Krueger and William Van Dynhoven were ordained priests for the Diocese of Green Bay, and it is now my pleasure to introduce to you Father Ryan Krueger and Father William Van Dynhoven.

## Father Ryan Krueger:

Hello, I'm Father Ryan. I think the best part of being a priest is simply being a priest. Having that knowledge of that deep and intimate relationship with our Lord and then that is lived out first and foremost through the sacraments, through the celebration of the Mass. That you're standing there at the altar and you are saying with the Lord, "This is my body, given for you. This is my blood, given for you." So, the best part of being a priest is simply being a priest.

## **Father William Van Dynhoven:**

Hello, my name is Father William. I think the one sentence that came back to my mind after the ordination Mass was, "Wow, now I'm a priest." The best part of being a priest is to be present to people, and I think in a way, to be able to bring people together daily through the holy sacrifice

of the Mass. Which is, you know, Christ among us, through his body, blood, soul and divinity. What a blessing that is.
