Middle school and young adult ministry coordinator Kristin LaPlante and her 7th & 8th grade faith formation class raised money to help the Water and Sanitation Project for India. Fr. Xavier, a missionary priest from the Diocese of Sivagangai, spoke to their classes about the need for clean water and sanitation. The middle school teens raised \$1,023.42. The students donated their own money, sold candy bars, and had a bake sale. They also received a gift from Catholic Financial Life. They were very thankful to have been able to present a "check" to Fr. Xavier who is in charge of the project.

Catholic Schools Across the Diocese

Rosary Mission Catholic Foundation | World Mission Services

PROJECT - To ship rosaries around the world!

Did you know that <u>every month</u> the Missions Office of the Catholic Foundation ships approximately 5,000 rosaries to orphanages, schools, missionaries, dioceses, disaster areas, and religious orders throughout the world? Generous monthly donors pay for these shipping costs.

In the Diocese of Green Bay, we are blessed with many dedicated rosary groups and individuals eager to share their faith by spending endless hours making rosaries. Without their faithful support and nimble fingers, we would not be able to offer this wonderful outreach project.

OUR DREAM

With the Rosary Mission needs growing bigger each year, our dream is to raise \$25,000 to start an endowment fund so this mission may continue for many years. Your generous gift will support the work of missionaries throughout the world. Many will come to know God's presence through prayer and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Dominican Republic Mission

Diocese of Green Bay | Fr. Mike Seis, Priest of the Diocese of Green Bay

PROJECT #1 - BUILDING LATRINES

The Diocese of Green Bay provides support and priests to staff two parishes in a very impoverished area along the Dominican Republic/Haitian border. They minister to approximately 90,000 people and more than 1,100 students in Catholic schools. One of their essential needs is basic sanitation. Currently, the parishes are working on the construction of pit latrines.

A latrine is a very practical solution to help with sanitation needs and control infectious diseases. A fully built latrine costs \$225 each.

PROJECT #2 - HOUSE REPAIRS

Many homes in Elías Piña, within the Dominican Republic, are in need of repair. Most repairs consist of replacing the corrugated tin on roofs and cementing the floors. The parish provides the materials, while families and individuals do the repair work.

A sheet of tin costs \$8, and a bag of cement costs \$7.

PROJECT #3 - ROOF FOR GATHERING AREA

Building a roof for the current basketball court at the high school will create space for meetings at the school, as well as a gathering place for the parish.


Any amount is appreciated to construct the roof, which will cost \$30,000.



- \$7 = One bag of cement
- \$8 = One sheet of tin
- 225 =Supplies for one latrine

Low-Cost Boarding Facility in Zimbabwe, Africa

Servants of Mary the Queen (AMR) | Sr. Martha Mafurutu

PROJECT - To build a low-cost boarding facility for poor students so they can attend school.

Sr. Martha serves as a chaplain at the Veterans Home in King. She is a Servants of Mary the Queen Sister from the Archdiocese of Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, Africa. The Sisters wish to equip students with education, skills, dignity, and self-reliance in Zimbawe by building a boarding facility for the students who cannot afford to attend otherwise.

Education is the doorway to success, as it opens avenues to professional jobs. Education is power and with your help, these students will be able to positively contribute to their communities.

How You Can Help:

\$1 = One industrial brick \$2 = One brickforce \$13 = One bag of cement

\$17.60 = One lockset







Build a Community Center in Haiti

James & Sandie Fitzgerald, Newton

PROJECT - To build community centers in Haiti that will provide a space for community meetings, health clinics, and to teach adult literacy.

Sr. Maria Marciano began her work in Haiti in 2011. She has built several aqueduct systems to provide clean drinking water to more than 100,000 people. She has also built more than 40 miles of road in this mountainous region, allowing access to schools and a craft and trade center she has built for this region. Sr. Maria plans to build six community centers (30 x 46 ft.) in the next six years. They will provide a space for community meetings, health clinics, and teaching adult literacy.

This is important because there are currently no doctors, dentists, or clinics in this area which has 100,000 people, and most adults over the age of 25 have never had any formal education. Sr. Maria now has an agreement with the Haitian government to provide a doctor one or two days a week and also works with sisters from Mexico and Spain to teach adult literacy.

Kressner Handmaids Children's Home

Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer | Sr. Angela Dassinor, Oshkosh

PROJECT #1 - BASIC NEEDS FOR ORPHANS

Kressner Handmaids Children's Home aims to give orphans hope and a better life by providing them with basic needs. They have access to academic and religious education to prepare them to become self-sufficient adults. They enjoy the home here because they live as a family.

The sisters have started a small-scale poultry farm to raise chickens, as well as goats, to support the orphanage.

PROJECT #2 - BUILD A CLASSROOM BLOCK

The sisters are trying to build a new classroom block for the upper primary class and a treatment center for immediate health care needs.

How You Can Help:

\$50 = Provide medical care

- 80 = Purchase one goat
- 80 = Feed one child for one year
- 100 = Set up a chicken farm
- \$100 = Tuition, school supplies, and boarding for one child for one year

Support a Seminarian in Guatemala

Missionary Fraternity of Mary Seminary | Mike & Mary Cesarz, Mequon

PROJECT - To support, educate, and form young men for ordination to the priesthood.

The Missionary Fraternity of Mary is a Mission Society located in Guatemala City, Guatemala. The Fraternity offers young men ages 14 and beyond a chance to become agents of change within society as missionary priests.

There are 150 priests of the Missionary Fraternity of Mary working in 11 countries, including the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Presently, the Fraternity is supporting the formation of 100 seminarians, 50 of whom are in the Major Seminary. With most of the boys coming from very poor areas, they cannot afford tuition.

You can offer hope for a more meaningful life, not only for the young men ordained as missionary priests but for the people they serve!



Over 4,000 youth have gone through formation at the Fraternity since 1981 and many have heard the call to priestly ministry.

How You Can Help:

- \$150 = Provides school supplies and incidentals for one seminarian for one year
- \$250 = Provides room, board, and tuition for one seminarian for one month
- \$500 = Provides one laptop for a Major Seminarian









Food and Shelter for a Refugee Child

Burundi Education Fund | Egide Nimubona, Appleton

PROJECT - To provide food and shelter for a Burundi refugee child in school.

In Rwanda, the majority of the Burundi refugee children outside refugee camps attend school hungry. The objective is to support these children and their families who cannot make it to refugee camps or survive due to harsh living conditions and traumatizing experiences.

Shelter to provide stability and food (twice a day) will give the children energy to focus in the classroom. Your donations will help provide provide rice, dry beans, potatoes, sugar, and black tea.

In 2018, the Burundi Education Fund supported 30 families and their 180 elementary school children. Our goal for the next few years is to support 100 families and 600 elementary children.

QUICK FACTS (ACCORDING TO THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES):

- About 425,000 Burundians have fled to neighboring countries since 2015.
- 90,562 Burundians became refugees in Rwanda.
- About 30,000 Burundians are urban refugees in the Archdiocese of Kigali and in the Diocese of Butare, Rwanda.
- About 47% of the Burundian refugees are children under 17 years old.

How You Can Help:

- \$20 = Provides food and water for one elementary school child for one month
- \$40 = Provides rent for a family of two parents and four children for one month

Casa San José Center in Bolivia

Community of Saint Paul | Fr. Michael Wolfe

PROJECT - To give the boys of Cochabamba the opportunity to leave the streets and return to their families.

The Casa San José Center, run by the Community of Saint Paul, is for boys who are living on the streets of Cochabamba, Bolivia. The reasons the boys end up at the center are diverse, but all are exposed to the same dangers including abuse, gang activity, violence, drugs, and forced prostitution.

What's unique to this center is its goal to work with the families of the children so they can return to their homes.

WHAT DOES THE CASA SAN JOSÉ CENTER OFFER THESE BOYS?

- Identifies boys living on the street via activities organized by social workers
- Informational and awareness sessions with the children and youth on the streets
- Recreational and educational activities in the center and on the streets
- Nutritional food and health care for boys in the center
- Group and individual counseling
- Reintegration of boys into families whenever possible and appropriate; includes family rehabilitation and follow-up
- When not possible, referral to a permanent center and follow-up

How You Can Help:

- 5 =Supports one boy for one day
- 33 =Supports one boy for one week
- 135 =Supports one boy for one month







Hogares de Santa Maria de Guadalupe

Guadalupe Homes | School Sisters of St. Francis

PROJECT - To provide housing, nutritious meals, health care, and spiritual guidance to orphaned and abandoned children in Santa Apolonia, Guatemala.

Guadalupe Homes was established in 1985 as a response to suffering caused by the Guatemalan Civil War. Today, the mission still deals with the aftermath of war, mainly in the form of poverty and alcoholism. Providing care for more than 40 children, each child receives a stable and loving environment. This enables them to thrive so they can grow into self-sufficient adults who work to change the cycle of poverty in Guatemala.

\$60 will provide warm shelter and nutritious food for one child for one month; \$180 will provide for one child's health and dental care for one year; \$200 will provide for one child's vocational training in carpentry, shoe making, and tailoring for a whole year.

- \$60 = Provides shelter and food for one child for one month
- \$180 = Provides health and dental care for one child for one year
- \$200 = Provides vocational training for one child for one year







Water and Sanitation & Girl's Education and Health Projects

Diocese of Sivagangai, India | Fr. Xavier Santiago

PROJECT #1 - WATER & SANITATION

Water is a very basic need, and we would like to construct wells, water tanks, and latrine facilities in our primary schools and orphanages. Children and their families are affected by water-borne diseases because of pollution and contamination. A clean source of water, as well as hand washing facilities by the latrines, will help greatly!

PROJECT #2 - GIRL'S EDUCATION & HEALTH

Education changes everything! This project aims to increase access to education and change the life conditions of young girls within the Diocese of Sivagangai in India.

Through the diocese's efforts to empower and educate young girls, they receive holistic health care including primary medical care, mental health care and counseling, and pro-life awareness, as well as hygienic health assistance.

How You Can Help:

- \$15 = Provides hygienic health assistance for one girl for one month
- 25 = Educates one girl for one month
- \$180 = Provides hygienic health assistance to one girl for one year
- 250 = Educates one girl for one year

Donations in any denomination support current efforts to provide sanitation facilities and clean drinking water.









IconHope

Brothers of the Sacred Heart | Br. Paul J. Hebert, SC

PROJECT - To provide food, shelter, and education to poor children on the Island of Cebu in the Philippines.

IconHope includes Project M.O.S.E.S. (Mobile Operations for Street-children Education and Services), which provides food and education to poor children. In four months, 6,000 packed meals and fresh fruit juice were served to 300 children. The educational component of the program provides school fees, books, clothing, and school supplies so children can continue their education.

IconHome is a permanent residential facility providing housing for abandoned young people on the Island of Cebu. It currently houses 20+ teenagers, providing permanent support, education, and daily contact with positive, Christian role models.

The project also offers younger children and teenagers opportunities to attend workshops and camps which cover spiritual and moral formation, health and hygiene, family formation, and child protection issues – all with the goal of helping each child recognize his or her giftedness as a unique child of God and hopefully become a positive contributor to the Church and society.

How You Can Help:

- 80 = Feeds one child for one year
- 100 = Allows children to participate in camp programs
- \$150 = Allows an older child to participate in a twomonth program that focuses on family value formation and child protection (includes room and board, educational materials, etc.)
- 200 = Educates one child for one year









Sponsor Education for a Burundi Refugee Child in Rwanda

Burundi Education Fund | Egide Nimubona, Appleton

PROJECT - To help with annual tuition fees (elementary and secondary education) for the Burundi refugee children outside the refugee camps in Rwanda.

The objective is to educate the refugee children and give them hope for tomorrow. Many carry physical and emotional scars from the unrest in Burundi that forced them to flee.

Currently, the Burundi Education Fund supports 300 children. Our goal for the next few years is to support 1,000 children in both elementary and secondary boarding schools. Boarding schools are necessary because children have no homes. Fees are paid electronically to Catholic Schools in the Archdiocese of Kigali, the Diocese of Butare, and the Diocese of Kabgayi.

QUICK FACTS (ACCORDING TO THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES):

- About 425,000 Burundians have fled to neighboring countries since 2015.
- 90,562 Burundians became refugees in Rwanda.
- About 30,000 Burundians are urban refugees in the Archdiocese of Kigali and in the Diocese of Butare, Rwanda.
- About 47% of the Burundian refugees are children under 17 years old.



How You Can Help:

- \$100 = Covers tuition for one child to attend elementary school (Grades 1-6) for one year
- \$450 = Covers tuition and room and board for one child to attend secondary school for one year







Scholarship Program & Water Purification System

Society for Faith and Children's Education (S FACE) | June Ingold, Green Bay

PROJECT #1 - SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In India, 233,000,000 children are deprived of an education due to poverty, exploitation, and gender discrimination. S FACE provides a three-year scholarship for post-secondary education for youth with a Christian vision. Over the past 10 years, over 350 youth have been sponsored.

PROJECT #2 - WATER PURIFICATION SYSTEM

Temperatures in May reach 110-115 degrees in India. Hundreds die of dehydration and heat-related ailments each year. Thanks to your generosity, a purified water system is now installed in the S FACE Mission Center and is available to the village people for drinking and cooking. Funds are needed to expand and maintain the system.

PROJECT #3 - MISSION CENTER FURNISHINGS

The S FACE Mission Center has been completed, and we are in need of furnishings, chairs, and tables for retreats and other activities.

WHO IS S FACE?

- Founded in 2006 in the Diocese of Green Bay.
- Our commitment is to answer the call of the Gospel to "hear the cries of the poor."
- We believe all children should have access to a Christian education regardless of their age, gender, culture, country of origin, or the socioeconomic situation of their families.
- Your generous donations go directly to a scholar's education because S FACE is blessed with advocates that keep administrative costs to a bare minimum.

- 10 = 0 one stacking chair for the Mission Center
- \$30 = When given monthly for three years, provides post-secondary education for one student
- 400 = One dining table for the Mission Center
- \$10,000 = Total cost of the Purified Water Project; donations in any amount are appreciated!









Friends of Haiti - Dental Care Project

Friends of Haiti | Joan D. Hogan, Green Bay

PROJECT - To provide toothbrushes and toothpaste, as well as dental care, to children in Haiti.

Over 16 years ago, Friends of Haiti was started by Fr. Larry Canavera through St. Philip Parish in Green Bay. It now brings medical, dental, and eye care, education and clean water resources, and agricultural and development work to the central mountains of Haiti.

The dental program is growing under the direction of Dr. Dave from De Pere. Understanding the importance of dental health in overall well being, Dr. Dave includes educational and preventive work for children.


Over 5,000 children's toothbrushes are needed and distributed each year. On each trip, we visit schools to help children understand the importance of clean teeth. Each child receives a toothbrush and toothpaste, as do those seen in the clinics.

FROM THE FRIENDS OF HAITI STATEMENT OF VALUES

We respect and embrace the dignity of the Haitian people and culture. We listen to their needs and respond by sharing our resources in a compassionate and collaborative manner. We are advocates for the Haitian people by recognizing and supporting their need for justice and basic human rights.

How You Can Help:

\$60 = Provides toothbrushes and toothpaste for 25 children







Farming Project & Upendo Children's Home

Missionary Sisters of the Precious Blood | Sr. Eusebia Urassa

PROJECT #1 - POLI SINGISI FARMING PROJECT

The farm offers sisters in formation the opportunity to learn about working the earth and producing their own food, creating a healthy balance between their academic and spiritual studies. The farm also provides training for community members, as well as food for their families and their own small-scale farming at home. It will also help sustain other mission projects when it becomes a good source of income.

PROJECT #2 - UPENDO CHILDREN'S HOME

At the foot of Mt. Kilimanjaro, Moshi, Tanzania, is an orphanage that the sisters have operated since 1934. Currently there are 64 children, ages two weeks to five years. The sisters provide for the children and actively look for parents to adopt them. When a family cannot be found, the sisters look for sponsors to assist with school fees. They are in need of sponsors for 25 orphans to attend school.

The kitchen and roof need many repairs, and the stove is beyond repair. Milk for the babies is also very expensive.

How You Can Help:

- 3 = One chicken
- \$10 = One liter of lactogen milk
- 25 = One chair
- 40 = One piglet

Society of the Divine Savior Salvatorians | David Holton

PROJECT - To spread joy and hope to international missions in Central and South America and African countries; specifically by sending food, school supplies, clothing, hygiene products, and many other relief supplies.

The Salvatorian Mission Warehouse was started in 1963 and has been supported by the Salvatorian priests, brothers, sisters, lay people, hundreds of volunteers and financial supporters ever since. By repackaging millions of pounds of donated relief goods, the warehouse is able to ship 20- and 40-foot containers to international missions in Africa, South America, and Central America.

In 2017, the Salvatorian Mission Warehouse sent 46 containers to 27 missions in 19 countries, totaling more than one million pounds of relief goods. Each container costs more than \$8,000 to ship. Financial support has also allowed the warehouse to send an additional 396,000 pounds of purchased rice, bringing hope and joy to thousands.

PROJECT - In order to create jobs and improve lives, our goal is to build economically viable communities in the greater Mierbalais area of Haiti that lead to self-sufficiency and improvement in the guality of people's lives.


The soap program will focus on 30 families in two rural chapels in Haiti, working together to operate small businesses. Business training and support will be provided to the program participants. Participants are taught to make soap, bleach, and laundry detergent to sell in the Haitian market.

Each participant is given a sample bottle to test and evaluate, and they are now eager to start producing their own products and business!

- \$3 = Provides ingredients for one gallon of liquid hand soap
- \$15 = Provides one set of protective goggles and rubber gloves
- 30 =Provides one stick blender
- 50 = Provides one scale

PROJECT #1 - HELP US BUILD A SCHOOL

Help us build an elementary school in Kikyusa, Kasana-Luweero Diocese, Uganda. There are no classrooms, so students study under trees in the compound. This means during the rainy season the children cannot attend classes. There is also a need for a teacher's house.

The area has many ants that eat and destroy wood, so for permanency, the building has to be made of bricks, cement, and iron roofing.

PROJECT #2 - HELP US GET WATER TO OUR SCHOOLS



Little Sisters of St. Francis, Sr. Juliet Nakayiza | Pat Degroot, Green Bay

PROJECT - To nourish the minds and bodies of the students at Stella Maris High School.

Stella Maris High School is a boarding school of 1,300 teenage girls located in a poor remote area of Nkokonjeru, Uganda. Many of the girls are orphaned due to recent wars and HIV epidemic. There is no government funding; the school is supported only by the Sisters.

THE GREATEST NEEDS FOR STELLA MARIS ARE:

- **Pigs** Since meat is scarce, they will offer protein to the girls' diet as well as help their education in agriculture.
- **Poultry Farm** Since this is a boarding school, the girls will benefit from both eggs and meat. It will also help the sisters to train the girls to be self-reliant.
- **Cows** A cow will allow the students to have milk and learn basic farming skills in their agriculture classes.
- Computer Lab and Textbooks The school's computers are old and don't always work. Textbooks in a variety of subjects are needed for the library.
- **Banana Plantation** Trying to reduce food costs, they are starting a banana plantation, which is a staple food. It will take 300 banana plants to create a plantation.




ABOUT THE COMMUNITY OF SAINT PAUL:

Support a School in Kavule Little Sisters of St. Francis | Pat Degroot, Green Bay

PROJECT - To alleviate the financial burden of school on families by providing desks and uniforms to students in Kavule, Uganda.

The school is located deep in the remote village of Kavule near the shores of Lake Victoria. Children used to walk miles and miles to school, so the Little Sisters of St. Francis established a school to help the community. Parents have a hard time sending their children to school due to cost, and instead of taking their children to school, they take them to the nearby landing site (their term for 'lake') to fish at a young age.

Providing basic supplies will help children attend school, and 150 uniforms and 50 desks are needed to equip the community with what they need.

PROJECT #1 - DIAPERS FOR GORETTI

Goretti was born with a congenital defect know as bladder exstrophy; her bladder protrudes from the wall of her abdomen. If left untreated, it can lead to greater complications including renal failure. Goretti's father is deaf and mute, making it very difficult to obtain work, and her mother had to quit her teaching job to care for her.

The goal is to help them afford quality diapers that will keep Goretti dry at all time, thereby reducing the risk of infections that can lead to more serious health matters.

PROJECT #2 - SUGARCANE FARMING TO SEND CHILDREN TO SCHOOL

The parish of Ibumbida Mission in the Diocese of Tanzania wants to cultivate sugarcane to help less fortunate families send their children to school. Due to the shortage of sugar in the country, the parish inherited 50 acres of land from the government to grow sugarcane. The first phase consists of planting twenty-five acres and then 25 more acres in the next phase. The yield from a well-maintained farm will provide tuition fees, food, boarding, school supplies, and health insurance for malarial attacks.
